# Workshops

#### **ADVENTURES IN POV:**

Giving Voice to Fictional Characters with Zsuzsi Gartner (Saturday & Sunday morning)

The single most important choice you can make when writing fiction is deciding what point of view (or points of view) a story should be told from.

Writers often adhere unconsciously to a particular POV like shipwreck survivors clinging to a raft -- what I call the default mode (and we all have one). During this workshop you'll discover a multiplicity of POV choices and how a narrative can radically shift depending on who's doing the telling or through whose eyes we're witnessing things from. We'll also look at how to develop character through POV and VOICE, and the difference between a character's internal and external voices.

You'll be doing writing exercises, reading this work out loud and discussing it with the class. You will also have the opportunity to radically revise a short piece of your fiction for the Sunday morning session. I will provide a mini Course Pack of readings we'll use for examples and inspiration and that you are welcome to take home with you.

#### IN THE FIRST PERSON:

The art of personal narrative with Charlotte Gill (Saturday & Sunday morning)

Writing memoir is like making lasagna. Everybody has a different way of doing it, but if the recipe contains a few key ingredients, it's bound to turn out well. In this workshop, we will cover the fundamentals of personal narrative. We'll begin with this question: what is creative nonfiction--and memoir, in particular? Next, we'll cover the essential ingredients for telling true stories in the first person. We will dip into the creative writer's toolbox to look at powerful story elements such as narrative voice, scene, and character. Lastly, we'll touch on how to design and structure your narrative, and how to incorporate secondary materials such as personal archives and research.

This workshop will follow an interactive discussion format with lots of time built in for your questions. You'll have the opportunity to share your story ideas and to practice reading your work aloud.

#### **SATIRICAL SUBVERSION:**

A Song-writing workshop with Geoff Berner (Saturday afternoon)

Come sharpen your lyrics to afflict the comfortable and comfort the afflicted with the man responsible for darkly hilarious and socially conscious (and danceable!) songs like "High Ground" and "When Deedee Gets Her Donkey" and more poignant numbers like "Light Enough to Travel." This workshop is open to anyone with a poisoned pen, or anyone looking for one. Bring an instrument if you've got one but no musical or even tune-humming ability is necessary. If you're a poet, fiction or non-fiction writer, comedian or musician this workshop could open up new avenues for putting your writing and ideas out into the world.

#### FINDING THE FUNNY:

Humour writing for page, stage or screen with Mark Leiren-Young (Sunday afternoon)

If you check any personal ad or dating site, the first thing on everybody's wish list is "a sense of humour." (Okay, sometimes the first thing is "vegan non-smoker," but still . . .) Humour is also a terrific way to convince people to spend time with a story, play, movie or article.

So, how do you find the funny? And how do you make it part of your writing?

This workshop will explore:

Finding and developing the humour in your writing voice.

Different types of funny – satirical, topical, surreal, sweet and sour...

Sharing your humour with an audience – from simply reading with verve to doing stand-up

Finding the right comic inspirations for YOUR writing.

# **Faculty Biographies**

**GEOFF BERNER** is a Vancouver singer/songwriter/accordionist and author. His biting humour, politically inflammatory lyrics, and impressive stage presence have earned him a cult following in Canada and abroad. Geoff tours frequently and has performed in 17 countries. He pretty much invented the punk-klezmer genre. His songs have been recorded by diverse musical acts such as Corb Lund, Kaizers Orchestra, Rae Spoon, and The Be Good Tanyas, who covered his

"Light Enough to Travel." Geoff's most recent album, Victory Party, won a Canadian Folk Music Award in the "Pushing the Boundaries" category. His first novel, Festival Man, was published by Dundurn Press in 2013 to rave reviews, and a picture book, We Are Going to Bremen to Be Musicians, was published by Tin Can Press and released at the Toronto Comic Arts Festival on May 7. www.geoffberner.com



**ZSUZSI GARTNER** is the author of the story collection All the Anxious Girls on Earth, editor of the bestselling Darwin's Bastards: Astounding Tales from Tomorrow, the former fiction editor of Vancouver Review, and a 2011 finalist for the Scotiabank Giller Prize for Better Living through Plastic Explosives. A former journalist and senior editor at Saturday Night, she has won numerous awards for magazine writing and a National Magazine Award for fiction. Her



stories have been widely anthologized, including in The Penguin Book of Canadian Humour, Best Canadian Stories, and broadcast on CBC and NPR in the U.S.. Recent fiction has appeared in The Walrus, The Letter's Page (U.K.), and is upcoming in SubTerrain. Zsuzsi taught MFA students for eight years at UBC, and has mentored numerous fiction & non-fiction writers through the Banff Centre's writing programs (including Giller-Prize finalist Sarah Selecky and Journey-Prize winner Miranda Hill). www.zsuzsigartner.com

She teaches creative writing in the graduate program at UBC and is currently faculty in Literary Arts at the Banff Centre. MARK LEIREN-YOUNG is a Renaissance humourist with awards for writing for film, TV, radio, books and magazines. He has also written a lot of funny stage plays. ### The Point Artist-Run Centre

The Point is the last remaining old-style vacation lodge of the many that dotted the lakes of the area from the early 20th century. The history of the site goes back to Harrop's Lodge, built on the shores of Alta Lake in the early 1920s, where Agnes Harrop read visitors' fortunes in the Tea Room jutting over the water. Harrop's was replaced by Cypress Lodge, built on the same spot by Dick Fairhurst in 1959. With its huge, stone wood-burning fireplace, high-beamed ceilings, and phenomenal view, The Point is a great spot for fostering creativity.

The Point Artist-Run Centre was started in 2010 by a diverse group of artists in the Whistler area. It regularly offers workshops, arts open houses, the annual Flag Stop Theatre & Arts Festival, dinner shows with live theatre and music, and collaborative and mentorship opportunities for artists.
